
#### Frances Hopkins Bible 1846



I am in possession of Frances' bible, passed down to me by my aunt, Jane GARCIA Rowland. I am able to transcribe much of it because I know the names. The underscores I couldn't figure out. I do know that Justin was born Jan 8th 1844. My records say 1847 in Long Island, Bahamas, but the bible says 1844. Also George Washington's biological parents were Justin's parents, John Thomas Knowles and Hannah Elizabeth Prance. He is Justin's brother. Their mother died 20 days after giving birth to George. Infant George was adopted and raised by Justin and his wife, Jane Ann. – KYH, 2025

#### TRANSCRIPTION:

- Frances Elizabeth and James Hopkins died on the 11th August 1865.
- Henrietta Hopkin born the 3 of December 1863
- Thomas Knowles son was married to Jane Hopkins at Key West the 11th of May 1865
- George Washington Knowles was born May the \_\_ in the year of our lord 1866. May 7th 1866

A few months after her marriage to Justin in 1865, Jane Ann's parents, James Hopkins and Frances Elizabeth HARRARD Hopkins contracted yellow fever and died on the same day, August 11, 1865 on Knockemdown Key. They were in their 30s. They left behind four children ranging from 18 years old to five. Jane Ann took into her own household her siblings, Charles and Henrietta. She and Justin may have also taken in the younger boys, James and John. (That the Hopkins died of yellow fever is family lore; it has not been verified. Yellow Fever epidemics were a frequent occurrence at that time. Jane Ann did record in her mother's bible that her parents died on the same day, however.)

James HOPKINS was born in 1828 in Colquitt, Georgia (parents unknown. Possible father John Douglas Hopkins.)

#### **MARRIAGE**



Family stories suggest that James and Francis moved to the Florida Keys to escape the yellow fever epidemics sweeping the country.

In 1850, James and Francis lived in Leon County, Florida with their daughter, Jane. Next door lived James and Martha(?) Harriede and Jacob Harriede. James and Martha are possibly Francis' parents?

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In 1860, James and Francis lived in Colquitt County, Georgia with four children: Char W., James H. (11), J.B. (3), J.R. (4 months). James was a farmer with \$350 in real estate and his personal estate was worth \$150.



#### **DEATH**

James Hopkins and Frances Elizabeth Harriede Hopkins died on the same day, August 11, on Knockemdown Key, and as yellow fever was raging through the islands at that time, it is likely that they succumbed to it. They left behind five children ranging in age from 18 to 2 years old.

At least one family account says that baby Rita died with her parents. This fact comes from a letter from a family member describing how James, Frances, and Rita all died of the yellow fever in August 1865. However, the 1870 census shows Henrietta living with Justin and Jane Ann Knowles so it is assumed that they adopted her.

#### Frances Elizabeth HARRIEDE (HARRARD)

Frances Elizabeth HARRIEDE (HARRARD) was born in 1832 in Colquitt County, Georgia. She married James HOPKINS in Leon County, Florida, on September 27, 1850, when she was 18 years old.

In research, Frances Elizabeth's last name is spelled differently on many documents. Harriede. Harrod. Most legal documents use 'Harrard', so that is what I use here. Her first name is often misspelled 'Francis'. Again, I go by legal documents rather than census records.

#### **MARRIAGE**



Jane Ann HOPKINS married <u>Justin Everett</u> <u>KNOWLES</u> in Key West, Florida, on May 11, 1865, when she was 17 years old.

Life on the Florida Keys had to have been hard enough just trying to provide food and shelter amidst turbulent weather and isolation from medical care and other people. James and Frances Hopkins would have had no help as they lay dying of yellow fever. In the extreme southern areas of Florida, the threat of yellow fever lasted all year round (Huffard, 84). As Key West had a port that brought goods from the tropics, it also brought yellow fever. And from there and other southern ports, an American epidemic was born. Life in those times were fraught with fear, grief, treatments that were often as horrendous as the virus, quarantines, collapsed economies, and crippled transportation.

By the summer of 1866, Justin's mother, Hannah Prance, died in Key West, 20 days after giving birth to George Washington on May 7, 1866. It was not unusual for women to retreat to Key West, some 20 miles west of Cudjoe Key, for the medical expertise in childbirth, so Hannah probably had gone there when her time for childbirth was near. There is no record of what she died of, although we can assume it had to do with the birth of baby George. Now motherless, the infant George was taken in to be raised by Justin and Jane Ann in Key West.

In 1868, around the time when the Ten-Year War in Cuba started, Justin and Jane lived in Key West, as did others in the Hopkins family, who appear to have moved from Georgia to Florida at some point between 1847 and 1865. The Hopkins may have left Georgia due to the Civil War.


In 1870, Justin and Jane Ann lived on Knockemdown Key. Living in their household were their two-year-old son, Silas, and Justin's little brother, George, who was now 3 years old. Recall that Jane's parents had died leaving several small children which Justin and Jane Ann were now raising, Charles was now 16 and Henrietta was 10.

In 1870, Jane lived on "the Keys lying Eastward of Key West" with her husband and their two sons, George and Silas. Also living in the household was her brother, Charles and her sister, Henrietta 'Rita'.

In 1880, Jane and Justin lived with their children, George, Silas, Hannah, and James at 444 Frances St in Key West.





In 1885, Jane and Justin lived on Watson St in Key West with their children, George, Silas, Hannah, James, Clara Dena, Alfred. At age 16, Hannah worked as a tobacco stripper at the cigar factory.

In 1900, Jane and Justin lived at 1126 Virginia St in Key West with their son, Alfred and daughters, Clara Dena, Lela, and Belle. Justin worked as a sponger.

Jane's husband Justin Everett passed away on December 29, 1900, in Key West, Florida, at the age of 53. They had been married 35 years.

In 1910, Jane lived at 1013 Catherine St in Key West with her daughter, Lela. Jane and Lela both worked as 'strippers' at a cigar factory. Jane's daughter, Belle lived next door at 1011 Catherine with her husband, Claude Freeman and their daughter.



In 1920, Jane lived with her daughter, Bell Freeman at 515 West 10th Ave in Tampa, Florida. Also at the home were Edna (Bell and Claude's daughter), John Canizares Rodriguez (Jane's grandson and Bell's nephew), and William J. Hall, a boarder. Claude and John worked as cigarmakers in a cigar factory. The boarder, Hall, worked as a riveter in the shipyard.

In 1930, Jane Ann lived at 1116 Seminary St in Key West, Florida with her son, Alfred and his wife, Elizabeth. Also living in the household were Ed and Jestin Woodson (Jane Ann's grandsons who were the children of her daughter, Lela).

A service for Charles W. Hopkins, 81, a 60-year resident of Dade County, will be at 3 p.m. tomorrow at Lithgow 54th Street Center. Mr. Hopkins was known for many years as the unofficial "mayor of Lemon City."

Mr. Hopkins, of 110 NW 52nd St., died Thursday, Lemon City was an early name for one of Miami's oldest neighborhoods.

Mr. Hopkins was a member of the New Testament Baptist Church. Survivors include three sons. Pierce W., Charles M. and James L., all of Miami; four daughters, including Mrs. Doris Baker of Miami; a brother and two sisters in Key West, and seven grandchildren.

James Berrian HOPKINS was born on November 1, 1857, in Colquitt, Georgia, to **James HOPKINS** (1828-1865), and **Frances HARRARD** (1832-1865).

When his parents died of yellow fever, James Berrian was 8 years old. His sister, **Jane Ann HOPKINS Knowles**, took into her own household two of their siblings, Charles, age 11 and Henrietta, age 2. In 1870, this blended family was still living on Knockemdown Key. It is not known who took in James Berrian.

In 1881, he married Mary Melisa CAREY.



In 1885 James was married and living in Key West next door to his sister, Jane Ann on Watson St. He worked as a seaman. In 1900 he lived at 1032 Catherine St. and was a cigar maker. James would later become prominent in Key West as a police officer. In 1910, he was living at 1033 United St. in Key West and working as a policeman. In 1920, he was living at 1022 Knowles Lane and still working as a police officer. The census of that year lists him as being unable to read or write.



He died on February 12, 1921, in Key West, Florida, at the age of 63, and was buried there.

John Simon HOPKINS Frow was born on January 14, 1859, in Colquitt, Georgia, to **Frances Elizabeth HARRIEDE (HARRARD)** (1832-1865) and **James HOPKINS** (1828-1865).

John Simon, whose parents were **James and Frances HOPKINS** of Colquitt Georgia, was raised by **John & Adelaide FROW** after John Simon's parents died of yellow fever in Aug 1865 on Knockemdown Key.

While he was never formally adopted by the Frows, he carried their last name for the rest of his life. His adopted father, John Frow, was the Cape Florida lighthouse keeper for many years and then moved to Key West and worked for a few years in the U.S. Custom House. He was killed by a small plane landing in the bay which

struck his fishing boat in 1918.

Captain John Simon Frow carried mail and passengers between Miami, Coconut Grove and Key West when there was no railroad. He survived an Indian attack on the lighthouse and another Indian attack at his homestead. He rode out the 1909 hurricane in the Gulf of Mexico. See the article below for those stories.

In 1870, John Simon lived with his adoptive parents, John & Adelaide FROW. John Frow was a lighthouse keeper. Simon Frow, the father of the elder John lived nearby where he worked with his son as the assistant lighthouse keeper along with Joseph Frow who was also an assistant lighthouse keeper.

In 1880, John Simon and John Frow (father and son) lived in Dade County, the elder working as a boat builder and the younger working as a sponger & turtler.

### The Miami News, Monday, August 25, 1924. JOHN S. FROW, PIONEER FLORIDA SEA CAPTAIN IS CLAIMED BY DEATH

Was Working on the Boat That Brought Brickells to Miami to Take Up Homestead; Family Twice Narrowly Escaped Being Massacred by the Seminoles.

John S. Frow, 64, retired sea captain and a resident of this section of Florida for 45 years, died Sunday morning at his home at 27 NE Ninth St. after a lingering illness.

The greater part of his life had been spent in commanding ships plying the ocean along the East Coast of Florida. When he came to Florida from Colquitt Georgia with his father, not a single building was standing in Miami. On one of the boats on which he was working the Brickells came to Florida to take up a government homestead.

At 14 years of age he was working with his father John Frow, who was the keeper of the old Cape Florida lighthouse, which at present is a historic landmark.

The white settlers were having great difficulties with the Seminole Indians at that time. On one occasion the Indians attacked the lighthouse and drove the boy and his father to the top of it and set fire to the wooden staircase. The top was iron and became almost unbearably hot as the fire crept up the staircase.

A \*\*\*\*\* worker who was with them was shot to death by the Indians after they had reached the top and the boy and his father stood on his body to keep their feet from

scorching. Death seemed certain but a sharp whistle from a steamboat which was entering the bay scared off the Indians and the boy and his father made their way to the ground below.

Shortly after he was married at 20 years of age, Captain Frow started to work on the ocean boats and continued this work until his retirement in 1912.

He carried passengers and mail on his boat the Emily B. between Key West and Coconut Grove when there was no railroad to connect the two sections.

For a time he manufactured starch from arrowroot at Coconut Grove where he had taken a homestead. Sale of the product was made at Key West.

While at Coconut Grove his father Mr. Frow and his family narrowly escaped massacre at the hands of the Seminole Indians when a disagreement occurred between the family and the tribes of the Everglades.

Indians in 11 canoes came down the Miami river and then went down to his home at Coconut Grove with the sole purpose of exterminating the family against which they had a grudge.

Mr. Frow and his father were working on a ship near the house when the chiefs of the tribe were sent ahead to hold conference with the white men.

Mercy was granted by the Indians only upon condition that the elder Frow, who was an abstemious man, agreed to become intoxicated. For the sake of the family Mr. Frow's father agreed.

While in that condition he was dragged about the yard by his long beard. The Indians stayed in the home for three days demanding the best that Mrs. Frow could provide.

When Henry M. Flagler, J. C. Parrott and J.E. Ingraham were constructing the extension of the Florida East Coast Railway to Key West, Mr. Frow was captain of the yacht Biscayne, which was used for all inspection trips.

His courage and efficiency as a sea captain were shown nobly when a terrific hurricane hit the East Coast of Florida in October 1909. A great number of vessels were lost and many lives.

Mr. Frow was captain of the tugboat J. H. Pelton when the hurricane hit. In spite of the crew's threats, he headed his boat away from the shore toward the Gulf of Mexico, and after a long fight was able to bring back his boat in safety without one of his crew being lost.

For three days his wife and children examined the bodies which were washed ashore and finally the head office of the railway company in Miami gave out an official report that the J. H. Pelton had gone down in the storm.

After his return with the boat he was given official recognition by the railway company for his remarkable way he had saved his boat and crew.

Besides the widow, Mr. Frow leaves three sons, John, Fred, and Albert, and three daughters, Mrs. J Knowles of Key West, Mrs. J.M. Warren of Miami, and Mrs. J. Abbott of Miami, and 14 grandchildren.

Funeral services, which are in charge of the W.H. Combs company will be conducted in the home at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon. Burial will be in the Woodlawn Park Cemetery.

Pallbearers will be Captain W.H. MacIntyre, Charles Albury, A.M. Brice, Jackson Peacock, Charles Peacock and Frank Hardee."

# DADE COUNTY PIONEER KILLED, STRUCK BY NAVAL AEROPLANE ALIGHTING ON BISCAYNE BAY

J. W. Frow Met Death This Morning on Way Fishing Grounds in a Sail Boat

CAME TO DADE CO. SEVENTY YRS. AGO

Unfortunate Man Was
Formerly Keeper of
Cape Florida Light
and Fowey Light

J. W. Frow, 77 years of age, pioneer resident of Cocoanut Grove, was killed this morning between 9 and 10 o'clock while in one of his small fishing boats in Biscayne Bay.

An airplane of Dinner Key station, landing in the bay after a flight, struck the fishing boat, demolished the vessel and so injured Mr. Frow that he died within an hour in the city hospital, to which institution he was rushed in all possible speed.

The blow which caused his death was evidently one on the left side of the head above the eye, which fractured the skull

frightfully.

#### Funeral Tomorrow

The body was turned over to the W. H. Combs Undertaking company to be prepared for burial. The funeral service will be held at 3 o'clock this afternoon in the Church of God in Cocoanut Grove, Rev. J. A. Self officiating. Interment will be made in the Woodlawn

Park cemetery.

All that is positively known of the details of the accident is that Mr. Frow went out into the bay in a small sailboat to fish. Persons at the Cocoanut where the plane had landed and knew that something was wrong. Without delay assistance was sent out from the Dinner Key station, and a Red Cross ambulance conveyed the unconscious man to the city hospital, where he died before an operation could be undertaken.

The deceased was one of the prominent, historic figures of this section, his residence in the Miami section dating back when he was only eight years of age or less. His father, Simon Frow, about 69 years ago, was keeper of the Cape Florida lighthouse, and the boy of eight at that time lived there with the family. Indian attacks on the lighthouse in those early days were repulsed by the heroism of the elder Frow, who made a notable defense of the property and prevented the massacre of the Cape residents.

#### Cape Florida Lightkeeper.

In later years the deceased, J. W. Frow, took charge of the Cape Florida lighthouse and remained in charge until the Fowey Rock lighthouse was built, then was given charge of the new one, which place he filled about three years.

Leaving the lighthouse duties, he went to Key West for a period of years and served in the United States custom house.

From Key West he moved to Cocoanut Grove and had since been engaged in the work of commercial fishing. He conducted the Florida House for sixteen years or more, and was widely known by the tourist public as well as residents of Miami and this entire section.

#### Many Relatives Survive.

Mr. Frow is survived, in the immediate family, by his aged wife, three sisters and their husbands, a brother and an adopted They are Mrs. J. W. Carey, Mrs. son. Geo. L. Robbins and Mrs. Robert Thompson, sisters; Joseph T. Frow, brother; and John S. Frow Hopkins, the adopted brothers-in-law is Abe Sawyer, resiresidents of Cocoanut Grove. Among dent of this city.

The coroner will hold an inquest this afternoof and probably an autopsy will be decided upon to inquire into the precise cause of death. Officials of Dinner Key station were in touch with the acting coroner, Squire Thomas of Cocoanut Grove, soon after the death of Mr. Frow

was announced.

A letter from a family member describes how James, Frances, and Rita all died of the yellow fever in August 1865. However, the 1870 census shows Henrietta living with Justin and Jane Ann Knowles and Jane's brother, Charles, so perhaps they adopted her. Charles did not marry until 1906. The writer of the letter is unknown. It was sent to Jane GARCIA Rowland.

Frances Elizabeth "Fannie" Hopkins was born on January 14, 1882, in Key West, Florida, to **Mary Melissa Carey** (1864-1937) and **James Berrian Hopkins** (1857-1921), In the early 1900s, her father James Berrian was prominent in Key West as a police officer.

Her paternal grandparents were **James HOPKINS** (1828-1865), and **Frances HARRARD** (1832-1865). When her grandparents died of yellow fever in 1865, Fannie's father, James Berrian was 8 years old. Her aunt (James Berrian's sister), **Jane Ann HOPKINS Knowles**, took into her own household two of their siblings, Charles, age 11 and Henrietta, age 2. In 1870, this blended family was still living on Knockemdown Key. It is not known who took in James Berrian.

Life on the Florida Keys had to have been hard enough just trying to provide food and shelter amidst turbulent weather and isolation from medical care and other people. James and Frances Hopkins would have had no help as they lay dying of yellow fever. In the extreme southern areas of Florida, the threat of yellow fever lasted all year round (Huffard, 84). As Key West had a port that brought goods from the tropics, it also brought yellow fever. And from there and other southern ports, an American epidemic was born. Life in those times were fraught with fear, grief, treatments that were often as horrendous as the virus, quarantines, collapsed economies, and crippled transportation. 


